It's high time you have a cup

Few things could be more English than enjoying a banquet of fine tea, moist scones and delicate desserts, so the next time you find yourself travelling to London, make sure you reserve some space to enjoy the jolly good culinary delights of a high tea experience. For visitors seeking to catch a glimpse of high society, head to The Savoy hotel and feast on a combination of homemade scones with clotted cream. finger sandwiches, artisan cakes and a wide tea selection from JING. High tea is part of the DNA of this iconic luxury hotel, with the option being available for patrons since it opened back in 1889. Dining like the Queen here will set you back £75.

Those looking for a modern English twist on this traditional affair, stop by Farmacy in Notting Hill, famous for its vegan delights. The plant-based restaurant offers up its own slant on the English high tea experience, with all teas here free from dairy, refined sugars and additives. Accompanying the meal is a selection of sweet treats such as mango and passionfruit cheesecake, garden berry pavlova and scones served with coconut clotted cream. Savoury alternatives include smoked tofu and truffle wraps, spinach and mushroom quiches and cucumber and dill sandwiches. High tea here will set you back £50.



Rex set for jets

Australia looks like it will see more airline competition, after Regional Express last week announced it had secured funding for a new jet service operating between Sydney, Melbourne and Brisbane.

The move, likely to use ex-Virgin 737s, would expand the airline's operations beyond its mainstay of regional turboprop flights, with a start date as early as March 2021 mooted. The carrier's Executive Chairman, Lim Kim Hai, said he was encouraged at the financing deal, adding "as a well-established carrier with an impeccable track record I am confident that Rex will deliver to Australians an alternative major city domestic service that is safe, reliable and affordable.

"Rex's affordable fares will support Australia's economic rebuild and recovery efforts," he promised.

P&O to farewell *Dawn*


P&O Cruises Australia has managed to secure a new purchaser for its *Pacific Dawn* which will leave the line's local fleet in the coming weeks after over 13 years.

The mainstay of the fleet, with capacity for just over 1,500 passengers, was billed as Australia's "first superliner" when she commenced operations out of Sydney in late 2007. She had previously been set to join the Cruise & Maritime Voyages fleet next year, but the COVID-19 related demise of that cruise company put paid to that plan and has now seen an alternate buyer secured.

Many Aussies and Kiwis have fond memories of *Pacific Dawn* which has carried more than 1.3 million people from local ports over the last 13 years on over 610 voyages.

P&O Australia CEO Sture Myrmell said while he was disappointed there would not be a farewell voyage, "I am excited about our future as we keep evolving as a brand and look to welcoming Pacific Adventure and Pacific Encounter to the fleet".

Whether you are looking for a different way to experience a place you have been before, or some tranguillity in a destination otherwise packed with tourists, you are never too young or old to become a sailing holiday convert. A sailing trip offers the opportunity to explore in your own time, find hidden treasures most tourists will not be privy to, and escape the hustle-and-bustle of the busiest destinations. Like other types of holidays, there's a sailing adventure to suit anyone, from total novices to salty sea dogs. More experienced sailors can hire just a vessel, while beginners can hire a crew as well, and you can even join a flotilla and sail with other travellers. And for those who want to up their skills. some companies offer sailing schools with courses for travellers with no experience or lots, and anywhere in between.

When it comes to destinations that lend themselves to a sailing holiday, there's a huge variety. Sailing is beginning to become almost as synonymous with Fiji as flop-anddrop holidays, and for good reason. The nation's wide range of operators, small and large, boutique and upscale, chartered and self-sail. means all levels of familiarity with this sector can get involved. Fiji gives plenty of opportunities for those who like to have more active adventures, with islands such as Rotuma, Savusavu and Vanua Balavu Island offering the chance to try scuba diving, snorkelling and hot springs. Visitors to Yasawa Island may also be lucky enough to spot a manta ray. On or off the boat, there are few better destinations around the world explored as well by sea, as Fiji.

It's not hard to see that exploring Greece by boat is a no-brainer, with over 6,000 islands, each as unique as the last. Sailing around destinations such as Santorini, Mykonos, Crete

and Naxos is an experience not to be missed in this nautically-inclined nation. Cliffside beaches, volcanoes and villages are all on offer for those exploring the Greek Islands by boat, many of which are not easily accessible except by sea. And if you set out from Athens you can explore iconic landmarks such as the Acropolis and the Parthenon.

This transcontinental destination straddling two seas offers no shortage of regions to be visited via

boat, and a wide variety of experiences to be had. Visit Gocek for its beaches and marinas, check out Bodrum for its ancient castles and architecture, hit up Marmaris for its nightclubs, and if you're after some relaxation, drop anchor at one of the many small islands off the shores of Fethiye.



Japan is known for bullet trains, sushi and busy cities. But the country also offers incredible natural scenery. Here are some of the national parks that we think are worth a visit.




Shiretoko National Park

To see Japan at its most pristine, look no further than Shiretoko National Park, located in eastern Hokkaido on the unspoilt Shiretoko Peninsula. While some of the park is accessible by road, no track leads particularly far, heightening the sense of isolation and escapism experienced here, with the far northern tip only accessible by boat or extensive hike. In this nirvana of nature, travellers can get up close and personal with local wildlife such as deer and foxes, but make sure you keep your eyes peeled for the resident brown bears that call this region home.

Daisetsuzan National Park

Daisetsuzan is located on Japan's most northern island, Hokkaido, and is its largest national park. The area is mountainous, with plenty of wildlife to spot including brown bears and deer. If you're wanting to get away from it all, Daisetsuzan is definitely the place to go. There are many hiking tracks throughout the park, best tackled between late June to September. A number of onsens (inns) around the edge of the park make a great base for exploring the park. particularly Asahidake Onsen, which has a ropeway leading to some easy trails around sulfurous vents.






Fuji-Hakone-Izu National Park

Located close to Tokyo and containing Japan's tallest mountain, Mt Fuji, this national park is both easy to visit and also stunning. As well as Mt Fuji, the large national park encompasses Hakone, the Izu Peninsula and the Izu Islands. The scenery ranges from mountains and lakes to islands, and visitors can enjoy hot springs and fresh seafood. The Izu Islands are a popular diving spot for many. In the Hakone region, make sure you drop in to the hot springs and Owakudani, which is an active volcanic zone complete with hot rivers, springs and sulfurous fumes, as well as views of Mt Fuji on clear days.

Kerama Islands National Park

Sunbathing isn't immediately something you associate with Japan, but that's certainly a popular activity in the Kerama Islands. Of these 36 islands, only four are inhabited, meaning there are plenty of untouched spots to explore. The national park is characterised by its pristine white sand beaches and the clear blue waters of the East China Sea. The islands are rimmed by coral reefs and include world-leading dive spots. Depending upon the time of year you visit, you'll also get a chance to do some whale-watching, getting up close with the gentle giants of the sea from January to March.

Norwegian Bliss Norwegian Cruise Line

Norwegian Cruise Line's Norwegian Bliss was designed for Alaska, and as a result, its livery was designed by Wyland, one of the world's premier marine life artists. Featuring a mother and baby humpback whale, the art also includes a number of other animals, such as penguins and turtles. We're not sure if this is going to restrict the ship's destinations in the future, but it would be interesting to see a family of whales floating through the Mediterranean.






Mein Schiff Herz TUI Cruises


Where in the world?





Don Pedro

This recipe comes to us from Bench Africa. In Southern Africa the Don Pedro is a classic dessert cocktail and it's usually made with Amarula but almost any alcohol can be used, even whiskey. Ingredients

1-3 shots Amarula or Baileys (or any milk liqueur) 3 scoops vanilla icecream

Method

Add the ingredients to a blender. Depending on how strong you like your cocktail you can use between 1 and 3 shots of the liaueur.

Blend until combined. Serve in a glass immediately.
